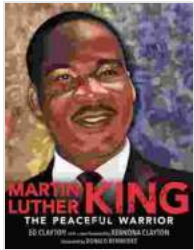


Martin Luther King: The Peaceful Warrior

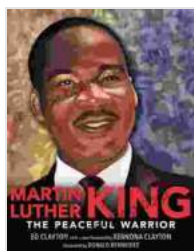
