
# Rabbi David Hartman: Challenging the Mainstream (1931-2024)



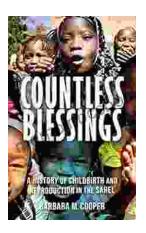
