


The Boy Soldier: Meet Jim Martin, the Youngest Anzac in World War I



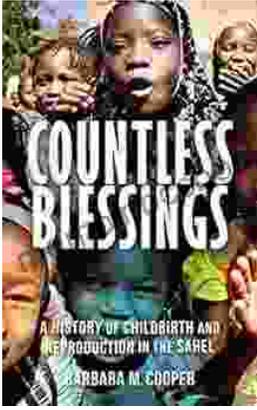
